choosing the Right Article

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Use “a” when the noun is **general** or mentioned for the first time.

Use “the” when the noun is **specific**, known, or previously mentioned.



He had wings like **a** butterfly.
(Any butterfly. No specific one is known.)



Applied to the question:

One had wings like **a** butterfly, and another had
legs like **a** pony.

(No particular butterfly or pony is identified.)



The children saw **a** pony in the enclosure.

The pony was small but strong.

(The pony is now known and specific.)



Important Exceptions Students Must Know

Exception 1:

“The” is used for unique or universally known things.

We use “the” even if it is mentioned for the first time.

Examples:

- the sun
- the moon
- the Earth
- the principal (when there is only one in the school)



Exception 2:

The" is used when context makes the noun obvious.

Even without prior mention, "the" is used if everyone knows which one is meant.

Examples:

- Please close **the** door. (the door in the room)
- She went to **the** canteen. (the school canteen)



Exception 3:

Comparisons sometimes allow "the" if a specific reference exists.

Example:

He had wings like **the** butterfly we saw yesterday.
(The butterfly is clearly identified.)





Grammar Tip

If the reader can point to **which exact one**, use “**the**”.
If the reader **cannot**, use “**a**”.

This rule holds in **grammar MCQ, cloze, and composition**.
